INTRODUCTION

Western Michigan University and Dillard University began building collegial interactions in the fall of 2006. As the relationship developed it was clear that Dillard University (DU) and Western Michigan University (WMU) embodied the same values when it came to student success. In the fall of 2015, a partnership was formalized between the two institutions. The primary focus of this partnership is to bring together a community of scholars to advance their educational opportunities, contribute to the academy, encourage faculty engagement, and improve the health and well-being of underserved communities.

The DU and WMU 3/2 collaboration was designed to give students an opportunity to complete a bachelor's degree at DU and complete a master's degree in counseling psychology from WMU within a five-year time frame. Program participants will complete 114 credits in three years at DU prior to entering the Summer Session at WMU. At the completion of 6 credit hours during the Summer I and Summer II sessions, credit will be reversed back to DU to fulfill undergraduate degree requirements. The remaining two years will be completed at WMU to meet requirements for the master's degree in counseling psychology. Students also have the opportunity get a limited license.

The DU and WMU 4+1 collaboration give students an opportunity to complete a bachelor's and a master's degree in Blindness and Low Vision Studies within a five-year time frame (4 years at DU and 1 year at WMU). Participants enrolled at DU will meet all undergraduate degree requirements while dual enrolled.



These students can take 3–6 credit hours at WMU during their senior year at DU. The remaining year will be completed at WMU to meet requirements for a master's degree in Blindness and Low Vision Studies.

WMU has awarded nearly \$2.4 million in fellowships to Dillard graduates at both the masters and doctoral level. Additionally, WMU provides support services and professional development for all graduate students. We believe it is not enough to get students admitted, we are concerned about degree completion and job placement.

WMU is committed to this partnership. We see value in the academic excellence of Dillard students and hope to expand this relationship in even more disciplines.


About


