STUDENT APPROVED PROJECTS ON CAMPUS: WHAT COULD GO WRONG AND WHAT COULD GO RIGHT?

Each year, Western Michigan University offers students a grant to fund their sustainable programs, projects, and initiatives on campus.

What does the grant do?

Empowers students to make sustainable change on campus.

Makes initial investments to spur on university funded programs and infrastructure.

Where's the money coming from?

\$50,000 offered each semester.

\$100,000 from an enrollment based fee. Remaining fee money funds student jobs and the Office for Sustainability operations.

Money not awarded in the fall semester rolls over into the spring semester.

Money not awarded at the end of spring semester rolls back to the Office for Sustainability.

Who decides what grants are funded?

Project Manager screens for grants that are safe, legal, and feasible.

New committee of eleven students decides on what grants are funded every year.

What could go wrong?

Office of Student Engagement oversees finances.

Students projects might not align with university sustainability goals.

University fails to adopt new initiatives or infrastructure beyond initial grant investment.

With enrollment declining the fixed dollar amount could hinder Office for Sustainability operations.

Grants cannot provide long term funding for projects (O&M, removal, site restoration).

New group of students every year means lack of consistency.

Students may award money to grants that are not aligned with university sustainability goals or that lack required university pre-approvals.

Students may lack technical expertise to evaluate proposals properly.

Where to go from here?


Use grant money to supplement capital projects.

Change fixed dollar amount to a percentage of the fee.

Allow student committee to serve on committee multiple years to retain expertise.

Train student committee members on sustainability principles before they decide on grants.
