



Deep Structures of Inequality in America

- 1619 to 2019:
 - 400 years since the first slaves were brought to this country
- Slavery lasted for 246 (62%) of those 400 years until 1865
- Jim Crow lasted another 100 years
- Slavery plus Jim Crow = 346 years 87% of our history





Dramatic Rise in Income Inequality in the US




FIGURE 2-16 Cumulative risks of imprisonment by 1979 for men born in 1945-1949 and by 2009 for men born in 1975-1979, by race and education.
