

PURPOSE

Courses and activities are developed by members with the support of the staff of Extended University Programs. Members may volunteer as planners, instructors, committee members or Advisory Board members.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

- 1. How to register: To avoid disappointment early registration is recommended as many classes fill quickly. Participants may register online (wmich.edu/olli), by phone using a credit card (387-4200) or in person by going to the Institute office, room #3202 on the third floor of Ellsworth Hall on the WMU campus.
- 2. **Early Bird Registration:** Members may register beginning May 1, others beginning on May 15.
- 3. Cancellations: Courses with low enrollments may be canceled. Those who registered for these courses may enroll in other courses based on space available or receive a tuition refund. Occasionally an instructor may need to miss a class and will reschedule that class. Participants will be notified of changes.
- 4. **Confirmation:** Registrants will be sent a confirmation and a receipt of payment within two weeks of registering.
- 5. Refunds will be processed if the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at WMU is notified two weeks prior to the first day of class. After that date refunds will be processed only in cases of emergency.

MEMBERS' TOUR OF THE ZHANG LEGACY COLLECTIONS CENTER

Wednesday, June 4 at 2 p.m. NW Corner of Oakland and Howard

This, the newest building on campus, is the home of the WMU University Archives and Regional History Collections. The center houses thousands of historical written documents, photographs and other items. The archives were housed for years in a decommissioned swimming pool on East Campus; the new building was made possible by the donations of many donors who contributed over \$8 million. Charles Zhang and Lynn Zhang, who both graduated from WMU in 1981 with master's degrees, were the major donors of this building that bears their name.

The center has won a first place award for design from the Association of University Interior Design. Sharon Carlson, Archives and Regional History Collections director, will speak to us about the Center and its holdings. The tour is free to OLLI members, but you must register to participate as the tour is limited to 25 persons due to space limitations. This is a repeat of a very popular tour that took place in January.

What's new for summer?

A theme running through our summer offerings is the combination of classroom sessions—and the word classroom is used loosely—with experiential learning. Fred Sammons and Barbara Rider's home serves as a classroom for adaptations we can make as we age; Lynn Houghton takes us to two cemeteries to learn some Kalamazoo history. Ron Kramer teaches a class about baseball and then fans can sign up for a Tiger game. But no, we have not scheduled a field trip in search of Bigfoot! We have scheduled ten courses for this summer, the most ever for a summer term, and hope you will find that one or more piques your interest!

Death Can Be Challenging Enough: What You Need to Know About Estate Planning

Sessions: 1

Our rapidly changing social structures and the regulatory environment affect every aspect of our lives. An estate plan addresses your goals and objectives during your life, needs caused by a possible disability and the handling of your estate after your death. Statistics suggest that although most adults realize the importance of estate planning many have not taken steps to create an estate plan or to update an existing plan.

Topics covered:

- 1. The probate process (estate settlement)
- 2. Estate planning documents:
 - a. Will(s)
 - b. Trust
 - c. Power of Attorney (Legal/Financial)
 - d. Power of Attorney (Health Care) and HIPAA
- 3. Estate and Gift Tax
- 4. Titling assets and funding trusts

About the Instructor: Michael Dombos is a life-long resident of Kalamazoo. Michael earned his law degree from The Thomas M. Cooley Law School, his undergraduate degree from Albion College, a master's (biology) and an M.B.A. at WMU. Michael is an adjunct faculty member at WMU where he teaches Estate Planning in the Haworth College of Business. He serves on the boards of several local non-profit organizations including WMU Theatre Guild, Hospital Hospitality House and others.

About the Instructor: Michiko Yoshimoto is currently the Japan Outreach Coordinator at WMU Soga Japan Center which provides information about Japanese culture and language to local community groups and schools, fostering an exchange of ideas between the U.S. and Japan. She graduated from Yokohama

City University in Japan in 2001 with a B.A. in Sociology and a high school teaching certificate of social studies. She came to the U.S. from Japan in 2009 and earned an M.S. in Socio-Cultural Studies of Education from WMU in 2014.

Kalamazoo's Unique Neighborhoods: Our Cemeteries

This three-part session will examine Kalamazoo area cemeteries focusing on Mountain Home and Riverside looking at their history, architecture and people - but also at their relationship to cemeteries in general. The first session will be held at the Zhang Legacy Center, the second at Mountain Home Cemetery and the third at Riverside Cemetery.

Note: During the second and third sessions we will be primarily on paved roads but both cemeteries are hilly. In addition we will be walking on the grass where the ground may be uneven. During the first session we will discuss options if there is inclement weather.

About the Instructor: Lynn Houghton is the Regional History Curator at the WMU Archives and Regional History Collections. She teaches Michigan History for WMU and co-authored the book Kalamazoo Lost and Found. She leads walking tours around Kalamazoo and coordinates a series of free public historic walks held during the summer and fall co-sponsored by Gazelle Sports and the WMU Archives. She has two degrees in history from WMU and a Master of Library and Information Science from Wayne State University.

More than Just a Game: The Social History of Baseball

While recounting the exploits of championship baseball teams and great ballplayers is fun there is also a broader social history of "America's Game" to explore. These sessions will present a number of "sociological stories" from the history of baseball in the United States. After an overview of that history the class can choose to explore a number of different topics such as: the social

origins of the game, how baseball was granted an anti-trust exemption, how racism and later integration changed the game, the unwritten baseball "codes" or how union leader Marvin Miller won free agency for the players.

Note: This course is not a repeat of last summer's course.

About the Instructor: Ron Kramer is professor of sociology and director of the criminal justice program at Western Michigan University. Although he primarily teaches courses on criminology he occasionally teaches the sociology of sport and sociological history of baseball. A lifetime baseball fan, Ron coached Little League teams for many years. A baseball player in his youth he now confines himself to playing slow-pitch senior softball in three summer leagues.

the American Red Cross, Kalamazoo Chapter. She has been a member of the Ladies Library Association since 2008 and is an outstanding LLA historian.

The Black Historical Experience in Out-State Michigan

Sessions: 3

Dates & Times: Monday 6/2, Tuesday 6/3 & Monday 6/9, 1-3 p.m. Location: College of Health and Human Services Room #1057

The scholarly literature on the African-American heritage in Michigan has increased since the 1970s. In reference to population mobility most writers have concentrated on the urban areas in the southeastern portion of the state. This three session offering covering the ante-bellum years to 1930 will be a stimulating journey via the "mythical" Underground Railroad with "hip" Idlewild as its final destination.

About the Instructor: Ben Wilson is an emeritus professor from WMU and a former director of the Africana Studies Program. He received a Ph.D. in American History from Michigan State University specializing in the ante-bellum Black Experience. He has authored and co-authored several articles and books including The Black Eden: The Idlewild Community, recognized by the Read Michigan Committee as one of 20 must read books highlighting people from Michigan. Ben has received numerous awards and honors in his career, and he remains active in his area of expertise.

The Family Trap: Addiction, the Brain and Enabling

Sessions: 2

How do people become and stay addicted? How are families hurt by addiction? How do families get in the way of recovery and how can families help their loved ones recover? Learn how heredity and neurobiology interact with psycho-social factors to create fertile ground for growing an addictive disorder. Learn how family enabling takes the sting out of being addicted. Learn how families can get help for themselves and indirectly for their addicted loved one(s). Understand why the addicted person and family may be reluctant to change and how to alter the rewards of relapse to motivate whole family recovery.

About the Instructor: Dr. Michael Liepman trained at the University of Michigan in addiction psychiatry. He taught there for 5 years before moving to Brown University in Rhode Island where he created a family oriented rehabilitation program for veterans. He then taught at the University of Massachusetts Medical School before coming to Kalamazoo in 1996 to assist in creating the Department of Psychiatry at MSU/KCMS-WMed. He has lectured nationwide and written extensively about his research on addictions in families.

What Makes Architecture and the Architect?



With illustrations the instructor will show some world-wide traditions and sources that inspire him as an architect and influence the shape of the houses he designs. In addition he will show details in the design process using several finished houses from around the U.S. as examples. We may also visit one or two of his recent designs.

About the Instructor: Born in

Kalamazoo, Michigan, Norman F. Carver, Jr. graduated from Yale University, then Yale School of Architecture. A recipient of two Fulbright scholarships, Carver researched Japanese architecture while attending Kyoto University from 1953-54. Returning to Kalamazoo he established his architectural practice in 1957. During a second Fulbright scholarship in 1964 he documented Japanese folk architecture and visited Cambodia and India to continue his architectural studies. In addition to his architectural practice Carver has lectured and instructed widely both at home and abroad. He is the author of seven books with over 80,000 copies in print.



Where's the Beast? A Critical Look at the Bigfoot Phenomenon

From Enkidu to the TV show Harry and the Hendersons, the wild man in the woods has been a popular motif in cultures across the world. However what we often think of as existing only in myth has recently ventured further from the woods and, according to some, should be recognized by the scientific establishment as a living species. This course will examine the fascination of Sasquatch and the evidence for and against its existence. The Bigfoot legend will be examined throughout history and across cultures. The information provided in this course will be drawn from a variety of sources, making use of information drawn from the disciplines of biology, sociology, anthropology, philosophy and literature.

About the Instructor: Justin Gish earned undergraduate degrees in sociology and philosophy from Indiana University-South Bend. He is currently a graduate student in the anthropology department at WMU where he served as a teaching assistant for two years leading sections of Race, Biology and Culture and Introduction to Biological Anthropology. He has also conducted ethnographic research on Bigfoot hunters in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.
