1. Explain briefly and clearly the proposed improvement.

A. This proposal adds the proposed major, BS in Youth and Community Development, as a qualifying undergraduate major for the Accelerated Graduate Degree Program (AGDP) for the Master of Arts in Family and Consumer Sciences (Child Life or in Family Life Education emphasis areas). The AGDP for the MA in FCS was approved during the 2016-17 academic year and went into effect Fall 2016.

B. This proposal also adds seven courses to the list of Designated Accelerated Degree Program Eligible Family and Consumer Sciences Courses (see item 4 below).

These two proposed changes are highlighted in red in the attached catalog copy.

2. Rationale. Give your reason(s) for the proposed improvement. (If your proposal includes prerequisites, justify those, too.)

1. More students may apply to the AGDP in the MA in FCS (in the emphasis areas of Child Life and Family Life Education) with the addition of the BS in Youth and Community Development as a qualifying major.

Currently the AGDP allows WMU students majoring in Family Studies or Child and Family Development (the two undergraduate majors in the Family Science area of the FCS department) with an overall GPA of 3.0, a GPA of 3.5 in the major, and senior standing to take up to 12 credit hours of 5000 and 6000-level courses which would count for both the undergraduate major and the Master of Arts (MA) in Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS; emphasis in Child Life or in Family Life Education).

- 2. Additional courses will allow students more options to count for both their undergraduate major and the MA in FCS (Child Life and Family Life Education emphases).

The effect on other programs, departments, or colleges will be minimal as students will come from FCS. All of the course listed in item 4, except one (CTE 5150), were approved as courses last year or are being proposed fall 2016. All of the courses can accommodate additional students from FCS and other departments.

The proposed additional AGDP courses are listed below. Undergraduate and graduate advisors must approve the specific courses qualifying students apply to the AGDP.

The following three courses are offered every other year but will be offered more frequently with increased demand.

CTE 5150 - Grant Writing in Career and Technical Education (3 credit hours)

ED 5950 Experiential Education and Place-Based Learning*

ES 5850 Social Justice and Community Organizing*

Each kinship care course will be offered once per academic year. Will be offered more frequently with increased demand.

FCS 5110 - Kinship Care Family Members: Strengths and Challenges (3 credit hours)

FCS 5120 - Educational Systems and Kinship Care Families (1 credit hour)

FCS 5130 - Health Care and Kinship Care Families (1 credit hour)

FCS 5140 - Economic Realities and Kinship Care Families (1 credit hour)

Family Science faculty members carefully schedule class sessions to avoid overlapping courses. The additional courses provide more options. Undergraduate and graduate advisors will carefully plan a program of study with each student.

Three students have been accepted into and have begun taking AGDP courses this fall 2016, the first semester the AGDP in MA in FCE went into effect. With the addition of the BS in Youth and Community Development we expect to continue to enroll between 3 or more AGDP students per academic year. Additional courses will allow more flexibility for students to take the full 12 credit hours in graduate courses.

For approximately 10 years, FCS has had one Family Science faculty specialist who, in addition to teaching, advises undergraduate transfer and online students. Last year FCS added a second Family Science faculty specialist to advise undergraduate transfer and online students. The two Family Science faculty specialists will be able to accommodate the expected 3 or more AGDP students per year. The CEHD Advising Office will also provide undergraduate advising and is expected to be able to accommodate AGDP students.

The addition of courses will not add to the amount of advising required, but rather will facilitate developing a program of study for students accepted to the AGDP for the MA in FCS.

This proposal is in response to informal and formal assessment activities. Advisors are talking with juniors and seniors who are or will be applying to the AGDP and reviewing the undergraduate course work remaining in their majors. Our goal is to ensure students can acquire up to the 12 credit hours allowed in the AGDP to ensure the graduate degree is as financially feasible as possible.

The proposed BS in Youth and Community Development and adding to the AGDP in MA in FCS relates to two objectives in the 2015-18 CEHD Strategic Enrollment Management Plan: Objective A.3: Explore the development of new degree programs and modifications of existing programs to meet external market trends and professional best practices, and Strategy A.3.c under this objective: Explore the development of interdisciplinary degree programs.

The graduate program in Family and Consumer Sciences provides an advanced program of study with a concentration in child life, dietetics, family life education, or textile and apparel studies.

The student will work closely with graduate faculty to develop a plan of study and individual research agenda that fits with personal career and academic goals. The program is appropriate for students interested in pursuing professional positions or as a foundation for continued graduate work leading to a doctoral degree in another department or at another institution.

Dietetics, Family Life Education, and Textile and Apparel Studies Concentrations

Admission Requirements

For admission to the master's program in Family and Consumer Sciences, students must satisfy all the requirements identified in the Graduate Catalog as well as specific departmental requirements. No one requirement is sufficient to guarantee admission or dictate denial of admission.

- 1. Possess a Bachelor of Science from an approved accredited school and a major closely related to the selected concentration.
- 2. Have a minimum undergraduate grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale in the last two years of undergraduate work. Non-degree, probationary status may be granted to students with a GPA between 2.5 and 2.99 in the last two years of undergraduate work. Students with that GPA range may establish eligibility for regular admission to WMU by completing nine credit hours of approved graduate-level courses toward their M.A. with a grade of "B" or better in each course.

Assistantships may be available to those wishing to pursue full-time graduate study.

Master of Arts in Family and Consumer Sciences (Accelerated)

The Accelerated Graduate Degree Program (AGDP) in Family and Consumer Sciences applies to the emphasis areas in Child Life or in Family Life Education. The AGDP allows qualifying students to begin accumulating credits toward completion of a Master of Arts degree in Family and Consumer Sciences while still enrolled as undergraduates in either the Family Studies major or the Child and Family Development major. Undergraduate students admitted to the MA in Family and Consumer Sciences (emphasis Child Life or Family Life Education) AGDP, with senior standing, may take up to 12 credit hours of designated 5000- and 6000-level courses for graduate credit. These designated courses may be used in completion of both the bachelor's degree and the master's degree.

Degree hours

The Master of Arts in Family and Consumer Sciences with an emphasis in Family Life Education requires a total of 30 credit hours. An undergraduate degree in a Family Studies major or a Child and Family Development major requires a total of 122 credit hours. Students enrolling in the AGDP for the maximum 12 graduate credits would earn 140 total undergraduate and graduate credits in contrast to the typical combined 152 undergraduate and graduate credit hours under the usual progression to degree(s).

The Master of Arts in Family and Consumer Sciences with an emphasis in Child Life requires a total of 41 credit hours. An undergraduate degree in a Family Studies major or a Child and Family Development major requires a total of 122 credit hours. Students enrolling in the AGDP for the maximum 12 graduate credits would earn 151 total undergraduate and graduate credits in contrast to the typical combined 163 undergraduate and graduate credit hours under the usual progression to degree(s).

Students will pay undergraduate tuition for the designated AGDP 5000- and 6000-level courses as undergraduates, and the courses will be included in the flat tuition rate. On completion of the undergraduate degree, the student will be re-classified as a graduate student and then will pay graduate tuition rates.

Students who have received their baccalaureate degrees will be ineligible to apply for this program and retroactively claim credits toward the M.A. degree.

Admission criteria

Students must have a declared major in Family Studies or in Child and Family Development, and have a minimum accumulated grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 (based on at least 45 earned credit hours, 15 of which shall be earned at Western Michigan University) and 3.5 GPA in the major (based on at least 12 earned credit hours).
